Cooper's Falls Widow is-Fatally Burned At Home

A Half Hours Later

When her clothing caught fire at her home last Saturday evening, Mrs. Robert Laidlaw, a Cooper's Falls widow, was fatally burned, and died about two and a half hours later

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Mrs. Laidlaw lived with her son, Reginald, at their home about a half mile from the store at Cooper's Falls. Reginald Laidlaw had come Falls. Reginald Laidiaw and come in to Ostillia on Saturday afternoon to do some shopping and his mother, who was partially crippled, was alone in the house.

When Reginald returned home about 7 o'clock on Saturday even

ing he found his mother lying in front of the kitchen stove in a mass of flames. Her clothing had been burned off, and feathers from a pillow were scattered about her and were burning. Dr. William Love-grove, of Washago, was called, but he was unable to do very much for Mrs. Laidlaw other than relieve her pain and suffering. She died at 9.35 o'clock on Saturday night. Provincial Constable William An-drews, of Beaverton, was called.

Provincial Constable William Andrews, of Beaverton, was called, and Dr. Norman McQuade, of Brechin, the coroner, accompanied him. They met Mrs. Laidiaw's body at Washago as it was being brought to Orillia by Mundell's funeral service.

Mrs. Laidlaw tried to put a stick of wood in the stove, as a partly burnt piece of wood was found half in the stove. When she put the in the stove. When she put the wood in the stove, her clothing caught fire and she was unable to beat it out. Mrs. Laidlaw apparently seized a cushion, which was on a couch near by, and attempted to snighter the flames with that, but the cushion split open, scattering the feathers about.

When her son returned home he threw his overcoat over his mother and extinguished the flames, and then called the docton. Mrs. Laidlaw was too badly burned to be able to save her life, but her pain was eased to some extent. During the two and a half hours between the time she was found and the time of her death, she was conscious, able to hear what was being said but unable to speak.

Mrs. Laidlaw was 74 years of age. Her husband died several years soo and she has been living with her son since that time.

Had hot her son returned home when he did, it is very likely that the house would have been destroyed by the fire. It was decided that an inquest would not be held.
