Officers Have Clue

Members of the sheriff's department working on the case intimated today that they had developed a slight clue that might lead to arrests some time late today, but refused to give out any statements of how they hoped to link any persons with the fatal shooting of the Indian.

Relatives Arrive

Payton's body was identified Monday by Wendel Melick, a student with Payton at Murray Agricultural school at Tishomingo last year, and by Walter Payton, a brother, who resides in Tishomingo. Walter Tarradell, county attorney of Bryan county, and an uncle of the young man, was in the city today working with county officials in an attempt to ferret out the slayer of the youth.

Friends of the boy who identifies the body declared that Payton was of a good disposition and had no enemies that they had knowledge of.

Owned Valuable Lands

The boy was declared to have possession of valuable farm lands situated between Durant and Caddo in Bryan county.

Payton was last seen when he approached Etheridge near the Santa Fe depot Sunday night and asked to borrow five cents to purchase a ticket to Norman. The money was given to the boy by Etheridge.

The body of the youth was discovered early yesterday morning on the Santa Fe tracks and police were notified.

Funeral arrangements had not been completed today, but will be held Wednesday either from Caddo or Durant. Payton's father, Ned Payton, lives on a farm twelve miles southwest of Howell and other relatives reside near Caddo.
