

## BURIAL OF A NAVAL HERO.

**Funeral of the Late J. M. Wainwright,  
Master in the United States Navy.**

The funeral of JONATHAN MAYHEW WAINWRIGHT, late Master in the United States Navy, took place at Trinity Chapel, in Twenty-fifth-street, at 10½ A. M., yesterday. The body of young WAINWRIGHT arrived here on Saturday in the United States steamer *Mohican*, on board which vessel he died on the 19th of June from wounds received on the 17th during an attack on the pirate ship *Forward*, on the coast of Mexico. The full particulars of the engagement in which young WAINWRIGHT lost his life were given in the TIMES of Saturday last, as narrated by the surgeon of the *Mohican*. Both before and after receiving his death-wounds he displayed heroism and bravery worthy of his distinguished sire, Commander J. M. WAINWRIGHT, who lost his life in the service of his country while commanding the *Harriet Lane*, near Galveston, at the beginning of the rebellion. The deceased was the grandson of the late Bishop WAINWRIGHT, and was appointed to the Naval School by President LINCOLN. He was only twenty-two years of age at the time of his death.

The funeral services at the church yesterday were in accordance with the forms of the Episcopal Church, and were conducted by Rev. Dr. HIGBEE, assisted by Rev. Dr. SWOPE. Among the naval officers present were Commander HARMONY, Commander WHITING, Commander HULL and Pay-master BISSELL.

The pall-bearers were Master J. P. Morrill and Midshipmen Chas. Briggs, J. J. Hunker, T. G. C. Salter, J. H. Bull and H. R. Tyler.

The mother of the deceased and a younger brother, ROBERT P. WAINWRIGHT, who had just entered the Military Academy at West Point, were the chief mourners—being the only surviving members of the family.

The coffin was of rose-wood, silver-mounted, and on the lid was placed the sword of the deceased, environed with wreaths of camellias. No sermon was preached, and after the reading of the burial service the body was removed from the church, and, followed by the relatives and late comrades of the deceased, was taken to Green-Wood Cemetery, where it was deposited in the family vault.
